After a year at the Ahmanson that was still feeling the lingering effects of the pandemic, we were thrilled to be getting closer to the business of normal. *The Prom* kicked things off with a touching tribute to the LGBGTQ+ community with audiences showing up to The Music Center Plaza in their finest high school era prom attire. It was a timely production with an almost cult like following, which was a pure joy to present at the Ahmanson.

OKLAHOMA!

Next up, it was *OKLAHOMA!* as you've never seen it before. Direct from Broadway and reimagined for the 21st century, the show won the Tony Award for Best Revival of a Musical before embarking on a National Tour and making its way to the Ahmanson Theatre where the *Los Angeles Times* would hail it as "Boldly, brazenly alive!" and go on to say that this production of *OKLAHOMA!* "electrifies the Ahmanson."

2:22 - A GHOST STORY

In October, we produced the U.S. premiere of 2:22 – A Ghost Story, a star-studded supernatural thriller just in time for Halloween. The production featured Constance Wu (Crazy Rich Asians), Anna Camp (Pitch Perfect), Finn Wittrock (American Horror Story), and Adam Rothenberg (Ozark), in a show packed with star power and jump scares.

Ain't Too Proud – The Life and Times of The Temptations played the Ahmanson in 2018 before it went on to Broadway, where it would be nominated for an incredible 12 Tony Awards. To celebrate its success, we invited the show back for a limited two-week homecoming run in December, where it played to packed houses every night.

THE SECRET GARDEN

Then, in January, we presented our own homegrown production of *The Secret Garden*, which was beautifully directed and choreographed by Warren Carlyle (*The Music Man*), and featured an incredible cast of Broadway vets.

After that, the classic musical 1776 came to us directly from Broadway, and featured a revolutionary cast comprising multiple representations of race, gender, and ethnicity, giving the classic musical an entirely new interpretation for our modern times.

A SOLDIER'S PLAY

A Soldier's Play won the 1982 Pulitzer Prize and rocketed back into the spotlight in 2020 with a Tony Award-winning revival production from Roundabout Theatre Company before coming to the Ahmanson. Directed by Kenny Leon and featuring thrilling performances from Norm Lewis and Eugene Lee, the drama brought both critics and audiences to their feet.

INTO THE WOODS

Finally, we closed out the year at the Ahmanson with an exclusive engagement of the Broadway revival of *Into the Woods*. Charles McNulty of the *Los Angeles Times* exclaimed, "No one should pass up the chance to see possibly the best production of *Into the Woods* in my lifetime." Thanks to its success, we wrapped up the 2023 fiscal year with our highest-grossing show of the year.

Fiscal Year 2023 opened with the return of Mike Birbiglia to CTG. *Mike Birbiglia: The Old Man and the Pool* is a hilarious tale of life, death, and a highly chlorinated YMCA pool, which would go on to appear on Broadway after a very successful run in Los Angeles and can now be seen on Netflix.

21,162 ATTENDEES **TWILIGHT: LOS ANGELES, 1992**

Then in March, we celebrated the 30-year anniversary of Anna Deavere Smith's, *Twilight: Los Angeles, 1992*, which drew on interviews with more than 300 Angelenos to explore the uprising sparked by the acquittal of the men charged in the Rodney King police brutality case. The play is a powerful piece of living record and one of the most important works in the history of the Taper.

THE SEARCH FOR SIGNS OF INTELLIGENT LIFE IN THE UNIVERSE

Following Birbiglia, we kicked off our 2022/23 Season at the Taper, featuring an entire slate of productions written exclusively by artists who are woman-identifying, transgender, and/or nonbinary. The first play to be featured was Jane Wagner's *The Search for Signs of Intelligent Life in the Universe*, starring the Emmy-nominated star of *Saturday Night Live*, Cecily Strong.

A TRANSPARENT MUSICAL

Finally, in May, we assembled quite possibly the largest ensemble of LGBTQ+ and nonbinary cast and crew members on one stage to mount the world premiere of *A Transparent Musical*, an exploration of the intersection of Jewish and queer history while celebrating the imperfectly human aspects of a universally relatable family.

In November, we were tremendously proud to continue our ongoing partnership with two-time Pulitzer Prize-winning playwright, Lynn Nottage. Her Tony Award-nominated play *Clyde's* got its turn on the Taper stage before going on to become the most produced play in the country last year.

COMING SOON Jan 29 - Mar 9, 2025 **FAKE IT UNTIL YOU MAKE IT**

The world premiere of Larissa FastHorse's play, *Fake It Until You Make It*, which was scheduled to open in August, was postponed as Center Theatre Group made the difficult decision to put regular season programming at the Mark Taper Forum on pause. We are excited to now present this important and hilarious work in the 2024/25 season-which will become the first play written by a Native American playwright to appear on the Taper stage.

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A NEW VISIONARY LEADER

SNEHAL DESAI NAMED NEXT ARTISTIC DIRECTOR OF CENTER THEATRE GROUP

On April 14, 2023, the Center Theatre Group Board of Directors announced Snehal Desai as the next Artistic Director of Center Theatre Group, joining Managing Director / CEO Meghan Pressman to lead one of the nation's largest theatre organizations.

"Center Theatre Group is a cultural force in the American theatre, and I am honored to be its next artistic director," Desai said. "CTG's vibrant legacy has been built by being the home for the preeminent theatrical artists of our time and the next great American play. I am humbled by the opportunity to enrich that legacy by uplifting and centering the diverse and thriving communities that comprise the beating heart of Los Angeles. I look forward to working with Center Theatre Group's board, artists, staff, and patrons in ensuring that CTG is a vital, timely, and relevant cultural home for all of Los Angeles."

As Producing Artistic Director of East West Players (EWP), the largest and longest running Asian American theatre in the country, Desai produced and directed three of the highest-grossing and most-attended shows in the company's 57-year history including the post-Broadway premiere of *Allegiance* starring George Takei.

During his tenure at East West Players, Desai led co-productions with Center Theatre Group, Pasadena Playhouse, Rogue Artists Ensemble, the Los Angeles LGBT Center, The Robey Theatre Company, The Fountain Theatre, API Rise, the Japanese American Cultural Community Center and TAIKOPROJECT. As an artistic leader, Snehal has sought to raise awareness of social issues that affect Angelenos through impactful and empowering storytelling.

A Paul & Daisy Soros Fellow and the recipient of a Tanne Foundation Award, Desai was in the inaugural class of Theatre Communications Group's (TCG) "Spark" Leadership Program and the first recipient of the Drama League's Classical Directing Fellowship. He was named by LA Weekly as one of its people of the year in 2018 and received L.A.'s Heritage of Pride Award in 2021.

Desai has served on the boards of the Consortium of Asian American Theaters & Artists (CAATA), Theatre Communications Group, and Los Feliz Charter School for the Arts (LFCSA). He currently serves on the board of the National Alliance for Musical Theatre (NAMT). Desai has been on the faculty of USC's graduate program in Arts Leadership and is a graduate of Emory University and received his MFA in Directing from the Yale School of Drama.

EDUCATION & COMMUNITY PARTNERSHIPS

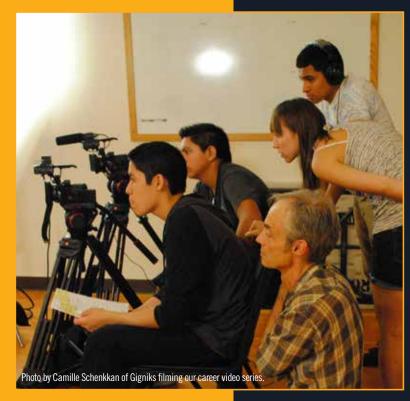
Center Theatre Group's Education & Community Partnerships (E&CP) programs inspire Angelenos of all ages to experience the joy and power of theatre. We work closely with teachers and schools through in-classroom residencies and through our Student Matinee Program, which brought 5,423 students to the theatre this past year, made possible by the generosity of our donors and sponsors.

Our nationally recognized paid workforce training programs provide onthe-job opportunities and instruction in companion skills such as financial literacy, project management, and ethical leadership. In FY24, we welcomed 395 participants to our free career fairs and engaged more than 35 earlycareer artists and managers through paid training programs.

CTG also has a deep commitment to community engagement, particularly in the Boyle Heights neighborhood in East Los Angeles, where our costume and prop shop has become a hub for intergenerational learning. We produce

free professional play readings and workshops in libraries and other community spaces, and this year we welcomed over 2,000 people to these events, including a play festival at East Los Angeles College.

We believe that everyone can engage in the joyful practice of theatre and we love connecting community members to the vibrant artists on our stages through our learning opportunities.

We are proud to offer a number of audience engagement initiatives and events that not only provide access to low- or no-cost tickets, but create an environment that engenders a greater sense of belonging and inclusion for diverse audience members at our theatres.

BLACK OUT NIGHTS FOR CLYDE'S & TWILIGHT: LOS ANGELES, 1992

Black Out Night is the purposeful creation of an environment in which a Black-identifying audience can experience a performance. Black Out Night provides an opportunity for Black people to be centered and welcomed into a historically white-dominated space.

2023 GALA: LIGHT UP L.A.

Center Theatre Group's *Light Up Los Angeles Gala* on April 15, 2023 **raised over \$1.3 million in support of our work both on and off our stages**—the largest amount in the annual event's history.

Attendees gathered for an evening not just under the stars but surrounded by them. This year's Honorary Gala Co-Chairs included Angela Bassett & Courtney B. Vance, Anna Camp, Adam Rothenberg, and Cecily Strong.

Attendees began the evening with a reception and dinner at the Dorothy Chandler Pavillion. The Mark Taper Forum then hosted special appearances and performances from Rachel Bloom, Sadie Brickman Reynolds, Deborah Cox, Culture Clash, Carmen Cusack, Jesse Tyler Ferguson, Brendan Hunt, Cheyenne Jackson, Justin Mikita, Peppermint, George Salazar, Joey and Faith Soloway, and Michael Urie.

Incoming Artistic Director Snehal Desai also made his first public remarks on the Taper stage. He spoke of the enduring legacy of Center Theatre Group and how he hopes to inspire others as he leads us into our next chapter.

"Change will come, but I do also want to acknowledge that all of this happens as we stand on the shoulders of giants," he said. "I feel so privileged to stand before you, connecting two of the most iconic theatres not only in L.A., but in the country and some of the greatest leaders the American theatre has ever known."

At the end of the night, everyone met on the Jerry Moss Plaza and danced the night away, with some even commenting that this was the greatest gala they had ever been to."



NEW FACES

Over the past year, Center Theatre Group has welcomed (and welcomed back) incredible talent into the CTG family.

Sarah Sullivan became CTG's new Director of Institutional Advancement in October 2022. Arriving at CTG directly from UCLA's Center for the Art of Performance (CAP), Sarah has over 25 years of experience working in cultural organizations and creative higher education, including the Los Angeles County Museum of Art, UCLA Hammer Museum, Art Center College of Design, California Institute of the Arts, Rhode Island School of Design and most recently UCLA's Center for the Art of Performance. She oversees all areas of Advancement.

Ricky Carter also joined the Advancement Team as the Director of Development in June 2022 overseeing all of Individual Giving, including the Major Gifts, Insiders, and Visionaries programs. With over a decade of experience in fundraising, Ricky came to CTG directly from GLSEN and GLAAD prior to that having played an integral role in leadership transitions for both organizations.

The Advancement team also welcomes Katasha Nelson as the new Director of Advancement Operations. Joining us from Playwrights Horizon in New York City, Katasha will lead in the operations that engage CTG stakeholders, supporters, and members.

CTG's dedicated Advancement team is here to help all of CTG's incredible patrons with their philanthropic support.

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Outside of Advancement, CTG hired Khanisha Foster as the Director of Equity, Belonging, and Engagement. With a focus on overall strategic and operational matters and community engagement, she has an overarching responsibility for the promotion, development, and coordination of initiatives related to Anti-Racism, Diversity, Equity, and Inclusion at CTG. Khanisha has been deeply embedded in the Los Angeles and national community as a leader in education, EDI work, and artistry.

CTG also brought on Brett Webster as the Director of Media and Content. He was the Head Writer/ Supervising Producer of "The Last Call With Carson Daly," and executive produced such shows as the live broadcast of "NBC's New Year's Show" and "The Carlos Watson Show" on Ozy Media, and was also a talent coordinator for "The Late Late Show."

Last but certainly not least, CTG welcomed back Garrett Collins to his CTG home as the Director of Marketing & Sales. In his role, Garrett is leading a team focused on providing the best experience for our audiences in all three of our venues. Prior to his time as the Vice President of Marketing & Communications at Pacific Symphony, Garrett was an integral member of the CTG Marketing & Audience Loyalty teams.

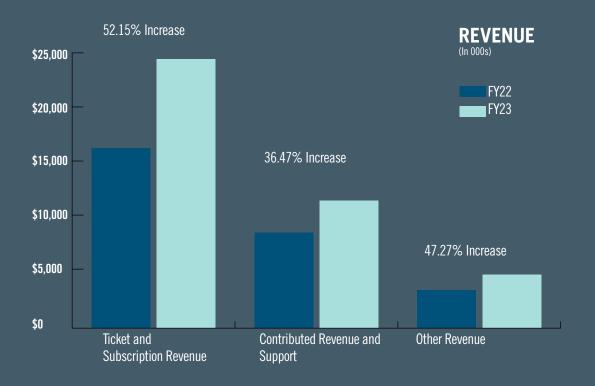


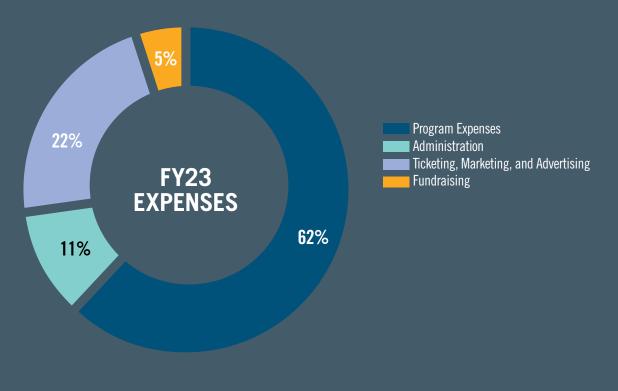

On April 14, 2023, a lifelong dream of mine became a reality when I was announced as the new Artistic Director of Center Theatre Group. As someone who has a deep love and profound passion for both live theatre and the city of Los Angeles, I could not be more honored to serve as just the third artistic leader in this beloved organization's 57-year history. CTG is a cultural force in the American theatre and its vibrant legacy has been built by being the home for the preeminent theatrical artists of our time and the next great American play. I am humbled by the opportunity to enrich that legacy by uplifting and centering the diverse and thriving communities that comprise the beating heart of Los Angeles. I know my new role also comes with a great responsibility, and I am up for the challenge and excited to help usher in a new chapter for CTG.

While the main purpose of this annual report is to look back, I want to close things out by looking forward and sharing my vision for CTG and some of the work we've already been doing since I officially began my new role in August.

By the time of my first day on the job, we had already made the heartbreaking decision to pause season programming at the Mark Taper Forum for the 2023/24 Season. This was an extremely painful, but necessary decision to make—and it had my full support. Having said that, I did not take this Artistic Director position with plans of leaving the Taper, one of the crown jewels of the American theatre, closed. Enter CTG:FWD.

CTG:FWD is a new initiative I created to use the Mark Taper Forum and our other venues in exciting and creative ways. Its programming is dedicated to special events, community gatherings, and legacy projects. Since its inception, we have welcomed audiences into the Taper for Alex Edelman's smash hit *Just For Us* and *Feinstein's at the Taper*, featuring long-time CTG friend and collaborator Michael Feinstein. We also announced our L.A. Artist Residencies and hosted a series of community events, such as the Los Angeles Theatre Summit, a gathering of local civic leaders, service organizations, and members from L.A.'s vibrant artistic community. In the spring of 2024, CTG:FWD programming continued with return presentations of Alex Edelman's *Just For Us* and *Feinstein's at the Taper*, the debut of a new partnership with MUSE/IQUE, the first Taper Legacy Readings, and a play festival commemorating the 10-year anniversary of community partnerships programming by CTG's Education & Community Partnerships team. In the winter, we were also proud to feature the L.A. Writers' Workshop Festival and the TheaterWorksUSA production of *El Otro Oz* at the Kirk Douglas Theatre.

Looking even further ahead, I want to Center Theatre Group to be viewed as L.A.'s cultural town hall. CTG should be as woven into the fabric of L.A.'s culture as the Hollywood Bowl, the Lakers and Dodgers, and the Hollywood Sign. As such, we have an obligation to serve the broadest possible audience in Los Angeles by providing an essential service and a common touch point for all Angelenos.

This takes time and work. Yet, it is essential work—and at the very heart of Center Theatre Group's artistic programming, financial sustainability, and our collective future. There is only "One L.A."—and there is only "One CTG."

I hope you'll continue to join us. It's going to be one incredible journey.
